## **Cookery School at Little Portland Street**

If you can't stand the heat, get out of the kitchen - but that's not an option for the 20 fellows of the African Leadership Institute. Stood in the kitchen of the Cookery School at Little Portland Street, the group, who have allowed Director to shadow them for the day, are split into four teams and each given a box of ingredients with the task of cooking a three-course authentic African meal in an hour.
